My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

St. Paul has always been an influential saint in my life. In the letter to the Galatians he wrote: "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me (Gal. 2:20)." This is a lesson that is more often than not, learned the hard way as we have all struggled to conform our lives to that of our Savior. In the movie that was released just some months ago, *Paul, Apostle of Christ*, the saint reflects back on his earlier life and recalled the ways in which he arrested, persecuted, and even killed many of the first Christians. He had the overconfidence that only youth can bring to be assured that he was acting in accord with the will of God. However, after his conversion, he struggled to come to grips with the fact that his former actions were not the will of God in addition to struggling with the fact that he was a murderer. His conversion didn't change who he had been but rather, the person he was to become.

My story is not unlike his and maybe your story isn't either. The fact remains that Christ has invited all of us into a deeper conversion and understanding of who He is in relation to us. We just need to remind ourselves of that fact. In doing so, we realize that our relationship with the Lord, and who we are today, doesn't change our past but invites into a more profound experience of Him living in us. We have experienced the Lord's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation and do the best we can to become a fuller person - the person the Lord is calling us to be. Like St. Paul, we can't change our past. What we can do is to accept the forgiveness the Lord offers us and work with his grace to become who He wants us to be. Our old selves have been crucified with Him and now the Risen Lord wishes to live in us as we work together effect further growth in ourselves and in each other; but all, according to His will. As your new pastor and shepherd, this is my vision for Holy Rosary: that you invite me and your fellow parishioners into deeper growth with Christ as I seek to do the same for you.

I'm excited to be a part of this journey with you. Please pray that I am faithful to this task. Pray for me and let us all pray for each other.

Sacramental Preparation Policies

A. Sacrament of Baptism

1. Infants... It is the pastoral practice of the Catholic Church to baptize the infant children of adult Catholics. Ideally, the preparation of the parents for the baptism of their children should take place prior to the birth of the child. While the Canon Law of the Church urges that it be done soon after birth, no explicit time is specified. Usually the Baptism of a healthy child will be done within weeks of the child's birth.

Preparation Policy for Infant Baptism: The parents of the child should contact a priest or deacon of the parish to set up an appointment for the preparation. Experience has shown that doing the preparation prior to the birth of the child is the most convenient for families. The preparation session usually takes about an hour. During that time, one can expect to discuss the meaning of Baptism in the Catholic Tradition, review the liturgical ceremony, complete any necessary documentation, and schedule the date and time for the Baptism. The Baptism is usually scheduled for a date within one month of the birth of the child or the completion of the preparation.

2. Children... The Catholic Church distinguishes between infants and children. In the category of children, there is a further division between those who have or have not reached Catechetical Age, which is usually seven years old. The preparation process tries to take into account the ability of the child to participate in it. Generally, the older the child, the longer the preparation process will take. We try to take into account the developmental level the child has reached in deciding the exact method and approach for the preparation of the child and his/her parents.

Preparation Policy for the Baptism of Children: The parent(s) of the child who has not yet reached Catechetical Age should approach a priest or deacon of the parish in the same way as described in the case of an Infant Baptism. Child can be present for the preparation especially if they are old enough to participate in the discussion. The same information will be covered as the meeting for parents of an infant-theology of the sacrament, the participation of the family in the liturgy, the documentation, and the scheduling.

A child to be baptized in the Catholic Church who has reached Catechetical Age will also receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the same ceremony. However, the usual practice in this parish is to delay the reception of these other Sacraments of Initiation so they can be celebrated with the other children their age. If the child is in High School, he/she may be prepared with the adults in the RCIA. **3. Adults...** The Catholic Church has mandated that unbaptized adults prepare for Christian Initiation through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). The RCIA is designed for the unbaptized. However, the classes can also serve as the educational program to prepare those persons baptized in another Christian tradition who seek full incorporation (membership) in the Catholic Church.

Preparation Policy for the Baptism of Adults: The adult is expected to participate in the RCIA by faithfully attending classes on Wednesday evenings for the full cycle, usually from September until Easter Sunday. It is encouraged that any interested person, meet with the Pastor as soon as practical prior to the next cycle of classes. This meeting will help begin the process to individualize the process for that person to become a Catholic Christian. This is especially important in cases where the person is a party to a marriage in which one of the partners has been previously married.

B. Sacrament of Confirmation

At the heart of Confirmation is the sealing of Baptism and a continuation in the liturgical celebration of the Initiation of a person into the Catholic Christian faith. This sometimes is known as the sacrament of Christian maturity. A person is not considered a mature Christian until they have celebrated Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist-the three Sacraments of Initiation. It is important that all three sacraments be received, and they are necessary before a person can serve as a godparent or sponsor for others.

1. Children... In the United States, the proper age for Confirmation is considered somewhere between the ages of seven and seventeen. In the Diocese of Nashville the regular time for preparation and celebration of Confirmation is in the Eighth Grade if the person was baptized as a Catholic as a child or infant. If a person was baptized in the Catholic Church as an infant, then the Bishop is the ordinary minister of the Sacrament of Confirmation. The Bishop makes a visit annually in the Spring to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation.

If the child was baptized in another Christian church, any priest may Confirm that person as a part of their Profession of Faith. However, if they have not yet reached the Eighth Grade, it is usually preferable to have the child receive the Sacrament of Confirmation with her or his peers. Children who have already completed the Eighth Grade will be assessed individually by the Pastor, the child's parents, and their Religious Education teacher to decide the proper time for their Confirmation. Preparation Policy for Confirmation of Children: The preparation for the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation by a child is done through a religious education program. The ordinary age for the reception of this sacrament in the Diocese of Nashville is the Eighth Grade. This can be done as an Eighth Grade student in the Academy or as a student in the Sunday Parish Religious Education program (PREP). Preparation for children who have already completed their Eighth Grade in school will be done through the Religious Education class appropriate for their age in conjunction with additional preparations guided by the child's parents.

2. Adults... Usually the adults seeking Confirmation are those who have been baptized in another Christian church and now wish to be fully incorporated into the Catholic Church. These would usually prepare for Confirmation through the RCIA. (See A.3.) There are adults who were baptized in the Catholic Church and are active members but have never received Confirmation. In their case, less preparation is needed. Confirmation for both groups of those already baptized means the sealing or completion of their baptism.

Preparation Policy for Confirmation of Adults: The preparation for the Sacrament is determined on an individual basis by the Pastor. An interview with the Pastor will usually help both of them make a decision about the process of preparation. While any priest can Confirm someone baptized in another Christian body, the Bishop must be the one to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation in the case of a person who was baptized in the Catholic Church. Since individual needs vary so much, the initial interview is needed to design a useful course of study.

C. First Penance and First Eucharist

For children baptized in the Catholic Church as infants, First Eucharist is the second of the Sacraments of Initiation they receive. Because the Catholic Church insists that children who have reached the age of reason (around seven years old) have the opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance, the preparation for First Penance is done during the same year as the preparation for First Communion. It is presumed that the parents of these children have been teaching them about their Faith as part of the way they fulfilled their promises made when the child was baptized. The preparation for these two life-time sacraments is usually done in the Second Grade to supplement what the students are learning from their parents. Preparation Policy for Children: Students are expected to participate in the Religious Education Program (Sunday School or the Academy or in another parish) which begins with Kindergarten. The active preparation for these two Sacraments is done during class periods of the Second Grade. Parents are expected to be active participants in the preparation of their children for Reconciliation and Communion. First Penance is usually celebrated in February, and First Communion is celebrated in early May. The dates of these liturgies and the meetings for parents are announced each year in the religious education programs.

Preparation Policy for Adults: Almost all adult preparation for the reception of the Sacraments of Penance and Eucharist is done in the context of the RCIA. Adults who are Baptized Catholics and have not received these sacraments, they should contact the Pastor to determine the proper means of preparation.

D. The Sacrament of Matrimony Preparation Policy

The Marriage Preparation policy of the Diocese of Nashville requires a period of not less than four months of formal preparation for the celebration of the Sacrament of Matrimony. Couples should contact the Church Office about making an appointment to begin the preparation process. Please note that no wedding date can be scheduled until the freedom to marry has been determined at that first meeting with a Priest or Deacon.

Ordinarily, the preparation program consists of attendance at the diocesan Engaged Couples Weekend in addition to a sufficient number of individual meetings with a priest or deacon to complete all other aspects of the preparation process.

It is presumed that if the bride and groom are members of the parish they will celebrate their wedding at Holy Rosary Church. Guidelines for Weddings at Holy Rosary Church is a document available in the Church Office that answers many of the practical questions associated with a wedding held in our parish church. These guidelines are very helpful in some of the long range planning that goes into a wedding.

If the ceremony is to take place elsewhere, it is possible that a dispensation may be required. Please ask the priest or deacon working with you about these situations.

E. Sacrament of the Sick (Anointing)

There is no specific preparation required for the reception of the Sacrament of the Sick. However, members of the parish should familiarize themselves with the theology and pastoral practice of the Catholic Church. Since the need for the sacrament is often in a situation of urgency or emergency, you need to know about this aspect of the Pastoral Care of the Sick in advance. You or a family member should contact the parish as soon as possible in such an emergency. If it is a scheduled procedure, you are encouraged to be anointed prior to your arrival at the hospital. In case of an emergency, please call the Church Office as soon as possible.

The healing prayer of the Church continues the healing ministry of Jesus in history, and the Catholic Church has identified a wide range of persons who would be proper recipients of the Sacrament of the Sick. Emergency situations involving life-threatening conditions are certainly the clearest cases for the need to administer Holy Anointing.

In less urgent cases, the Sacrament is still appropriate. For example, anyone facing serious surgery should consider asking for Anointing before the surgery. Other conditions that make reception appropriate include chronic illness, weakness from advanced age, and mental illness. If you are in doubt, please contact the Pastor to discuss your situation.

In situations that keep you from getting to Mass-a stay in the hospital, an extended period of being homebound, or residence in a convalescence facility-you should make sure that the Church Office is aware of your status so the parish can have someone bring Communion to you on a regular basis.

Funerals

One of the tragedies of life is that we all will, at one time or another, have to plan a funeral liturgy for someone we love. The parish community and staff at Holy Rosary Catholic Church want to assist you in this and be a resource for your family and loved ones. When a loved one dies and you want to have a Catholic Funeral here at Holy Rosary, please have a member of the immediate family call the church office and speak to either the pastor or a member of the church staff. This is so we can make sure Holy Rosary is available at the time you want the liturgy and that the priest and other members of the liturgical staff are available for the Funeral Mass. You will then meet with the Funeral Home to make the final arrangements. Please have the Funeral Home call the Church Office to finalize arrangements. We want to help you with the planning of the Liturgy. Our Director of Music Ministry. Chrissa Jennings, will meet with you to plan appropriate readings and music. Chrissa can be reached at 615-268-3959 at any time. At this painful and difficult time in your life Holy Rosary wants to respond with sensitivity and pastoral concern. As Christ walked with the two men on the way to Emmaus, we want to walk with you as you prepare the Funeral Liturgy for your lost loved one.

Music Ministry

Music Ministry is an active, growing ministry at Holy Rosary Church. Liturgy of the Word, Liturgy of the Eucharist and the Homily are all tied together by appropriate liturgical music. Each member of the Music Ministry works very hard to be the best they can be and take their role of leading the congregation very seriously. We strive to have beautiful blend and tone, BUT our main goal is to sing and play the message.

Rehearsal is important to providing good liturgy. The rehearsals also provide a place for social bonding and prayer support. We laugh together, pray together, as well as, sing together. Many great friendships emerge from people with the same goal: to provide the best liturgical music experience possible each week.

Calvary Cemetery

Calvary Cemetery is the Catholic cemetery owned by the Diocese of Nashville. The mission of Calvary Cemetery is to provide Christian burial services as part of the ministry of the Church for the pastoral care of persons who have died and their families. Recent improvements at Calvary Cemetery now allow interment in three ways: a ground plot for a casket or ashes, a mausoleum for above ground interment of a casket, and a columbarium for interment of ashes (cremation). All three forms are in accordance with Church regulations.

We have space available to meet the needs of the diocese for the next 150 years. All of our grave spaces are reasonably priced at \$1,600.00 each which is considerably less than for-profit cemeteries. Our open/close fees are also well below the rates of local corporate-owned cemeteries. We also have sections for deacons and veterans.

Calvary Cemetery is located at 1001 Lebanon Pike, just a block east of Fessler's Lane. The original site of 47 acres on Lebanon Pike was purchased by Bishop Patrick Feehan, Third Bishop of the Diocese of Nashville, shortly after the end of the Civil War. The Calvary Cemetery was dedicated on November 29, 1868, and it has been in continuous operation as an institution of the Diocese of Nashville since then. Bishops, priests, and many Catholics of Tennessee are buried at Calvary.

You can contact the office of Calvary Cemetery at 615-256-4590. Office hours are 7:30am-4:00pm Monday through Thursday, 7:30am-3:00pm Friday, and on Saturday by appointment. Explanation of Stewardship

and the Envelope System Stewardship is a fundamental part of the life of a Christian and every member of the Catholic Church. Christians offer a part of the gifts they have received to build up the Kingdom of God in gratitude. This can be done through the gifts of time, talent, and treasure. All members are strongly encouraged to get involved in the ministries of the parish and community programs to assist the poor.

In the case of financial contributions, the Diocese of Nashville recommends a standard based on the biblical injunction to give a tenth of our income to God. The Bishop encourages us to consider giving 5% of income to the parish, 2% to the diocese, and 3% to various charities.

For those making financial contributions, you are encouraged to use the envelopes sent each month to all registered households.

There are advantages to using these envelopes, but personal checks achieve some of the same needs for the accounting required by Church and State laws of such contributions. The explanations below should help members to understand this part of stewardship in the parish.

Functions of the Envelope System

1) Encourages parishioners to make regular contributions The support of the Church is the responsibility of every person in the parish. Usually that support is given in the form of a monetary donation. The Bishop's Stewardship Appeal asks that each household consider giving 5% of its income to the support of the parish and 2% of its income to the support of diocesan ministries.

2) Allows the parish to keep records of church contributions The parish appreciates and respects the privacy of persons who make donations to the Church. However, it is important for our accountability and your welfare that we can keep track of the gifts in any form. In order for us to maintain these records of donations, it is necessary that the Office know who made the donation, what the amount was, and the donor's intention (e.g., which collection it is). The envelopes mailed to you monthly are the best way to do this.

Personal checks also give us the needed information to record the contribution if the envelope is not used. However, there is no way of accounting for cash donations unless they are placed in an envelope with the donor's name on the envelope. When you use the envelopes, please write the amount you have given on the outside of the envelope. This makes life a lot easier for those who count the collections each week.

3) Notifies the parish office of any address changes

One of the most valuable resources we have is the address list of the members. This list, which is the source for the directory you are reading, allows us to contact members to keep them informed of parish and diocesan activities. The packet of envelopes sent to you monthly is the way we can maintain that address file at a reasonable cost. If you are planning to change your address or your parish, we would appreciate a timely notice to avoid loss of contact.

The Different Kinds of Envelopes

In addition to the envelopes for occasional events such as Holy Days of Obligation and National Collections, a person can expect to find the following envelopes in the monthly mailing packet. The parish respects the wishes of each donor and uses these contributions only in the category in which they are given by you.

For the Needs of My Parish Sunday Collection [White-Weekly]

This is the primary source of income for all the parish activities. Your generosity supports the many activities of the parish. Our budget is based largely on this income.

Share My Food [Blue-Monthly]

Share My Food is the income for the parish charities. We assist persons within and outside the parish with a variety of needs. It also supports our participation in programs like Room in the Inn and Loaves and Fishes.

Haiti Mission [Pink-Monthly]

Holy Rosary was one of the first parishes in the area to adopt a Catholic parish in Haiti. Funds from this collection go to this poor parish in an impoverished country to support their work.

For the Needs of My Diocese [Gold-Monthly]

This is what most people think of when they hear The Bishop's Stewardship Appeal. This collection is sent to the Bishop for the support of a variety of diocesan educational, charitable, and administrative services. Checks should be made to The Diocese of Nashville. Use the self addressed envelope to mail your contribution directly to the diocesan office, rather than dropping it in the collection basket at Mass.

Capital Improvements [Green-Monthly] These contributions allow us to maintain the buildings and grounds without jeopardizing the funding of ongoing programs and services of the parish. The most recent visible use of these funds was the replacement of the roofs over the entire complex, and updating of the landscaping. Future plans include the re-paving of our parking lots, and the replacement of our energy management program.

Holy Rosary Academy Facility Improvements [White/Royal Blue-April & October]

These contributions will help with the ongoing maintenance of Holy Rosary Academy's buildings and grounds so that monies that come from tuition, subsidies, contributions and development campaigns can go directly to the services that assist our students.
