BAPTISM

Baptism is a celebration of initiation into the Christian community of faith. Since an infant cannot make an act of faith on their own, it is the parents, the sponsors, and the entire family of God who take on the responsibility for the child's development of faith: a life that includes prayer, worship, and love for humankind. Parents should be parish members and both are expected to attend the Baptism Preparation Class (offered monthly throughout the Waukesha Catholic Parishes) prior to the Baptism. The Sacrament of Baptism is offered during Mass on the 2nd weekend of the month. Baptism is offered outside of Mass on the 1st Sunday of the month immediately following the 10:30 AM Mass. Baptisms are not scheduled during Lent.

RECONCILIATION

Reconciliation is the celebration of forgiveness and the profound mercy of God. Parish children are usually introduced to the sacrament around the age of seven, or second grade. There is a formal period of preparation which includes the support, participation and example of their parents, who are actively involved in this process. Formal preparation begins in second grade. See the bulletin for Communal Penance Services held regularly during Advent and Lent, as well as scheduled private confessions. INDIVIDUAL RECONCILIATION is available Saturdays at 4 PM. Reconciliation is also available by appointment.

EUCHARIST

The Parish Community gathers each weekend to celebrate a Eucharistic Liturgy, or Parish Mass. Weekday Masses are also offered at 8:30 AM Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings. Baptized Catholics, having been prepared to celebrate Eucharist, and who are in a state of Grace, are welcomed to participate fully in a Eucharistic Liturgy. Children who have been Baptized as Catholics and who have been prepared for and celebrated the Sacrament of Reconciliation are also invited to be prepared for and celebrate the Sacrament of Eucharist after two years of preparation. This begins in 1st grade and is received at the end of 2nd grade. Parents and guardians also take an active role in the formal preparation of their children to receive Eucharist for the first time.

CONFIRMATION

Confirmation is the final Sacrament of Initiation and completes and strengthens baptismal graces. Recipients are enriched with gifts from the Holy Spirit to defend the faith in word and deed. Confirmation candidates are asked to enter a program of preparation that involves instruction, service, prayer, and participation in parish community life. Opportunities for parent and sponsor involvement are an integral part of the preparation process of our youth. We celebrate this sacrament in collaboration with the youth of St. Mary, St. Joseph and St. William Parishes, also in Waukesha. All youth of the parish, who are sophomores in high school, or sixteen years of age, are invited to register for and participate in the formal preparation, which is two years.

MARRIAGE

Holy Matrimony is a sacrament, administered by the couple themselves, with a priest or deacon as a witness of the church. We strive to enable couples to develop a beautiful and permanent relationship through an understanding of their own strengths and weaknesses. Due to the need for adequate preparation, marriage arrangements should be made at least six (6) months in advance. The deacon will assist couples in preparing for marriage through an instructional program concentrating on a deeper awareness of self, sexuality, and the sacramentality of marriage.

HOLY ORDERS

Encouraging and fostering vocations to the priesthood and permanent diaconate is a crucial part of our parish's mission. It is through Baptism that we all share in the priesthood of Christ Jesus. It is through the sacrament of Holy Orders that men are called from the faith community to serve its spiritual needs.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

The healing touch of Christ is needed in times of pain. This is especially so when one is ill. This sacrament confirms the presence of Christ to the infirmed, to give them strength and comfort in their hour of greatest need. It is an anointing for their battle to overcome the disease, to find some meaning in their suffering, to keep hope alive, and to find healing of body and spirit. When one is struck down by disease, the entire parish community is wounded. Thus, when the need is felt, please contact the parish office to celebrate this sacrament. Communal Anointing is celebrated the first Saturday of each month after the 5 PM Mass.

COMMUNION TO THE SICK AND THE HOMEBOUND

Those parishioners not able to be with us at Sunday Liturgy remain part of our faith family. Volunteers bring Communion to the sick upon request. We reflect on the Sunday readings and share the true presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. We also share parish news and commit to pray for each other. PASTORAL COUNCIL

Each parish in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee is to have a pastoral council to guide the development and the exercise of ministries. In the city of Waukesha cluster of parishes, each of the four parishes selects members from the parish to sit on a city wide pastoral council. The city wide pastoral council provides spiritual leadership, pastoral planning, and the formulation and implementation of policies in accordance with its mission statement. Terms for each member is 3 years.

Catholic Community of Waukesha Pastoral Council

The citywide Pastoral Council provides the means for the four Catholic parishes in Waukesha to fulfill the pastoral mission of Jesus and the Church. It does this by:

- developing Catholic identity, promoting evangelization, and fostering stewardship.
- striving to build a community of disciples who recognize their baptism calls them to lives of holiness, witness and service.
- taking into account the needs and priorities of parishioners, the Archdiocese, the broader community, and the world.

The citywide Pastoral Council is composed of twenty-four (24) members; three (3) at-large members from each parish for a total of twelve (12) at-large members, and the following *ex officio* members; the three (3) pastors and one (1) associate pastor assigned to the four (4) parishes and two (2) trustees from each parish for a total of eight (8) trustees.

Standing committees/commisssions make regular reports and appropriate recommendations to the Council. The Pastoral Council meets on the third Thursday of the month, currently at St. William Parish, during the months of August through June (except December). Parishioners from all parishes are strongly encouraged to attend.

Parish Committees

The archdiocese has mandated that each parish have four STANDING Committees. These are: Worship, Life-Long Faith Formation, Human Concerns, and Finance Council. We have an additional standing committee—Stewardship. Each standing committee may also have one or more "subcommittees" which address specific tasks of the standing committee. We have listed each of the standing committees as well as their sub-committees.

Worship Committee

Meets the 1st Tuesday of every month to coordinate and oversee all worship activities.

Art & Environment Committee: decorates the church for each liturgical season and special feast days.

LITURGICAL MINISTRIES

Lectors read the Scriptures and prayer intentions at each Mass.

Ushers seat people, collect the Mass offerings, choose someone to take up the Offertory gifts, and distribute bulletins.

Greeters meet people at the Church doors and hand out hymnals.

Servers are boys and girls, 5th grade and up, or adults, who assist the priest at Mass.

Eucharistic Ministers help in the distribution of Communion.

Eucharistic Minister Coordinators determine if there are adequate numbers of Eucharistic Ministers for each Mass, and call for volunteers as needed.

Set up ministers clean the chalices and trays to prepare for the next Mass.

Avalon Square is a nearby retirement community for which we provide liturgical support. On Sundays after the 8 AM Mass, a Eucharistic Minister leads a prayer service and distributes Communion to those residents unable to attend Mass elsewhere.

Communion Ministers at Waukesha Memorial Hospital (WMH) Each day the four parishes of Waukesha take turns bringing Communion to Catholic patients at WMH.

CHOIR ACTIVITIES

Music is a beautiful enrichment of the liturgical Word. St. John Neumann has an adult choir, which meets and practices on a regular basis. Others contribute their musical talent in the playing of various instruments.

ECUMENICAL COMMITTEE

Partners in Christ Covenant meets with members from neighboring Christ the Servant Lutheran Church to promote interdenominational faithcommunity relationships and cooperation.

RCIA

(Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults)

Is a year round process of inviting either the un-baptized adult or an adult baptized into another faith tradition into full communion with the Catholic Church. Opportunities for meeting are offered several times each month and specific details are always in the bulletin.

RCIA Team: are members of the parish who work together to make the RCIA process as welcoming and effective as possible.

RCIA Sponsors: are paired with candidates to serve as spiritual friends and guides.

RCIA Catechists: facilitate faith sharing within the group when the RCIA candidates are sent forth from the assembly during the parish Eucharistic celebration each week.

Life Long Faith Formation

Meets the first Tuesday of the month to coordinate and oversee all faith formation activities

This committee is responsible for developing a parish awareness of, and commitment to, life long learning and formation. This formation is aimed at personal conversion and growth in faith. The committee is advisory to the professional staff and provides a comprehensive approach to integrating and coordinating all aspects of Christian formation/education in the parish.

FORMING OUR FAITH

Our primary approach to Christian Formation/Education is participation in Forming our Faith. Service to the community, parish and liturgy is emphasized. It is a bi-weekly program that utilizes books and classroom approach. The children are divided by grade and study age-related material. Requirements for Reconciliation and Eucharist are two years of formation. Confirmation preparation is also a two year formation program. The Sacrament is usually received in the 11th grade.

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Children are invited at the 10:30 AM Mass to process from the church to the chapel, to hear Liturgy of the Word, Readings and Gospel at an age appropriate level in understanding. No fees or registration is required.

ADULT FORMATION OPPORTUNITIES

Each month we offer several opportunities for adults to enrich their own faith. Currently, we offer Bible Study, using the material of Jeff Cavin. It is called the Great Adventure Series. Participants have a choice of meeting times-either Thursday evenings or Saturday evenings. Other opportunities for formation are also offered occasionally. Look for specific details in the weekly bulletin.

YOUTH GROUP ACTIVITIES

Various activities are offered to middle and high school youth throughout the year to come together for fellowship and formation. We also offer opportunities to go as a youth group to larger Archdiocesan and statewide events such as St. John Bosco Day and the Wisconsin Catholic Youth Rallies. Along with the other 3 Waukesha Parishes a Summer Mission Trip is offered. We are always looking for adult volunteers to help plan and chaperone activities.

An Outdoor Spirituality Center

As a parish, we have been blessed with a generous expanse of land. For the past number of years, we have been in the process of developing much of that land into an easily accessible, always available destination site for prayer and meditation. Access to the rosary path, the prayer path, and the labyrinth is available 24/7, any time of the day or night. You are welcome, at any time, to stop and pray.

WAUKESHA CATHOLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

Waukesha Catholic (School System) is a Catholic elementary school offering classes for 3 year old kindergarten, 4 year old kindergarten, 5 year old kindergarten, and grades 1-8. Since 1990, it has been a collaboration of the four Waukesha parishes: St. Joseph, St. John Neumann, St. Mary, and St. William.

Currently 528 students attend our three campuses. Students start at St. William Campus for K3, K4, K5. They continue their education in grades 1-5 at St. Mary campus. They move on to St. Joseph Middle School Campus for grades 6-8. Waukesha Catholic's faculty includes 25 classroom teachers. Additionally there are specialists and support staff which include resource specialists, a guidance counselor, physical education teachers, music teachers, computer specialists, an art teacher, Spanish teacher and teaching assistants.

The curriculum includes Religion, Language Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies, Spanish, Art, Music, Physical Education and Technology. Specific to our middle school is our Project Lead the Way (STEM) curriculum which brings science, technology, engineering and mathematics together in the classroom in a very cohesive way. A fine arts team of teachers leads a wonderful creative arts curriculum throughout all of the grade levels.

Before and after care is provided at St. Mary Campus and St. William Campus.

Waukesha Catholic is funded by tuition paid by the families, parish subsidy, Wisconsin Choice Program, and third source funding. Tuition assistance is available to families who are members of one of the four sponsoring parishes.

Human Concerns

Everything we have and possess is a gift from God, and as faithful stewards of God's creation, we are called to give back to God the first and best portion of our time, talent, and treasure. As a parish, we practice this life commitment by giving 4% of our contribution income to various charities and outreach opportunities. The other 96% supports the operating budget of the parish, and is crucial to continuing the mission of this parish. We keep costs down and simultaneously build friendships by volunteering our time and talents for lifelong faith formation and many other parish service groups, as well as a variety of vital fundraisers. We encourage and challenge each parishioner to embrace this lifestyle and join our parish family as faithfilled stewards of our time, talent, and treasure.

SERVICE GROUPS

The service groups of St. John Neumann developed from parish needs and concerns. They cover a variety of areas and are volunteer activities. Please contact the parish office for more information.

Saturday Morning Cleaning Crews consist of parishioners who tidy up the church and Gathering Space for the weekend, as you would prepare your home for guests.

Lawn Mowers cut, trim, fertilize & treat the lawns around the buildings.

- **Receptionists** answer phones, take messages, and perform small clerical tasks. Training is provided. Weekday hours are 10 AM to 1 PM or 1 PM to 4 PM.
- **The Welcome/Hospitality Committee** hosts Hospitality Weekend the 2nd weekend of each month.
- **Collators and Staplers** help out with bulk mailings as needed.
- **Bulletin Stuffers** come in during the week to place inserts in our weekend parish bulletins.
- **The Garden Ministry Angels** plans, plants and maintains meditation gardens, and helps enhance the appearance of St. John Neumann's grounds. Projects are weather-dependent, primarily in the spring & fall.
- **Blood Drives:** Both Christ the Servant Lutheran Church and St. John Neumann Parish participate in regular opportunities for members to donate blood through the Blood Center of Wisconsin. Regularly scheduled blood drives at both churches are coordinated to allow members of both congregations to participate at each on a regular basis. Finance Council

Meets ten times per year Mike Ferguson, chairperson, 262-513-5975

This committee makes decisions concerning all aspects of parish finances. It establishes the budget for each fiscal year, and oversees stewardship of resources, personnel matters, church fundraising, and upkeep of the physical facilities and property. The activities and recommendations of this mandated standing committee are firmly rooted in the biblical concepts of stewardship and justice.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

A subcommittee of the Finance Council, this ministry oversees the maintenance and upkeep of the physical facilities and grounds. They solicit competitive bids for planned repairs and improvements, and organize work days for projects taken care of in house.

PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

This subcommittee of the Finance Council oversees the compilation and updating of the Parish Personnel Handbook for employees. It also organizes ad hoc search committees to meet the staffing needs of the parish.

PARISH FESTIVAL COMMITTEE

This committee is responsible for identifying and recruiting volunteers, and performing outreach to the Waukesha business community for donations of money and goods for St. John Neumann's Parish Festival. The committee begins meeting in January and convenes as necessary.


St. John Neumann Congregation History

In response to a petition from St. Mary parish to relieve overcrowding, St. John Neumann Congregation was canonically established in March 1981. Father Michael Neuberger became our first pastor on July 1, 1981, and offered our first Mass on September 13, 1981, in the gym of Rose Glen School. For the next six years, our new congregation established a special spirit with the understanding that the PEOPLE are the Church–not the building. The congregation was formally dedicated by Archbishop Rembert G. Weakland on November 29, 1981. The Archdiocese of Milwaukee purchased 24 acres of land at the present church site in January 1982, but slow growth of the area postponed the ability to build. Meanwhile, the faith community grew strong at its temporary Rose Glen home.

In 1986, we received the approval of the Archdiocese to proceed with building on the property. Construction continued through the summer of 1987, and was completed in September. The first Mass in the church was held on the sixth anniversary of our first Mass at Rose Glen, on November 29, 1987. In June 1993, Fr. Neuberger received a new assignment. Fr. Thomas Demse was assigned as our second pastor, and served through January 1997. Joining Fr. Tom, Fr. Dennis Budka served as our first Associate Pastor from 1994 through June of 2000, when he was reassigned to an *in solidum* team ministry in Fond du Lac. Our third pastor, Fr. Glen Graczyk, was installed by Bishop Richard Sklba on July 6, 1997. and retired from active ministry in July, 2003. Fr. Don Zerkel came out of retirement to serve as interim pastor until Fr. Jim Loehr took up the reins as pastor on June 22, 2004, and he served until his retirement on June 20th, 2010. Fr. John P. Schreiter served as pastor June 27th, 2010, through June 8th, 2012. Fr. Curt Frederick began ministry as our current pastor, along with Fr. Kevin Barnekow as our Associate Pastor, on June 10th, 2012. Fr. José Nieto joined our staff as Associate Pastor in June of 2014, when Fr. Kevin was reassigned as Associate Pastor to St. Alphonsus in Greendale.

The Eagan Chapel Story

During the last three years at Rose Glen, the parish was blessed with a visitor from the Marquette High School staff, Fr. John Eagan, SJ, who served as the first helpout priest. Though only a weekend visitor, he soon became "one of the family." In late 1986, illness caused him to miss more and more of these visits, and early in 1987, he was diagnosed with advanced cancer. In a move which characterized his love of life and nature, he chose to live naturally — including one last bike excursion — over prolonged treatment. He went home to the Lord on Palm Sunday, 1987. Our parish chapel is dedicated to his memory.



Our Patron Saint

St. John Neumann Congregation was named after the first American male saint, John Neumann, CSSR, the fourth bishop of Philadelphia (1811-1860). He was born in Prachaitz, Bohemia. After completing seminary studies in 1835, ordination was delayed because his native Diocese of Budweis was sufficiently staffed with priests. He decided to become a missionary in the United States, and was finally ordained by the Diocese of New York after serving four years near Buffalo, NY. After being consecrated Bishop of Philadelphia in 1852, he established over 80 churches and 140 schools. Bishop Neumann, while small of stature and humble in manner, possessed superb organizational ability and knowledge of six languages. Beatified in 1963, his canonization was in June, 1977.

Additional Ways To Help Support The Parish

BRING IN YOUR EMPTY INKJET CARTRIDGES FOR RECYCLING.

If you own a printer or copier which uses liquid-filled inkjet/bubblejet cartridges, don't just throw them in the trash. Wrap them in something leakproof (like a zip-lock bag) and place them in the appropriately marked box in the Gathering Space. St. John Neumann will receive \$2 each for most cartridges. Please do not bring cartridges containing graphite or other types of powdered toner.

SENTRY RECEIPTS

St John Neumann receives 1% of the tape total of all receipts turned in by the parishioners. Here's how it works:

- Ask for a "Funds for Friends" sticker when you check out.
- Cash register receipts for groceries, liquor, and cigarettes are valid.
- Receipts must have a sales date to be valid. If you pay for your groceries with a debit or credit card, don't tear off the bottom of the receipt; just blacken your account number.
- Drop your receipts in the appropriate marked box in the Gathering Space.

CLIP AND SAVE CAMPBELL SOUP LABELS

With these labels, we can purchase needed equipment for our office and/or various parish programs. Look for the list of eligible products next to the Campbell's collection box, on the Information Table in the Gathering Space, located near the east entrance doors.

SCRIP

Scrip is a Waukesha Catholic school and parish fundraising program. The concept is simple: purchase gift cards and gift certificates in various dollar amounts, and anywhere from 2-25% of the value of the card is donated back to the parish. These donations are split with the Waukesha Catholic schools. Scrip is sold after each Mass most weekends of the year, excluding a few major holidays. Orders are delivered the week after they are placed.
