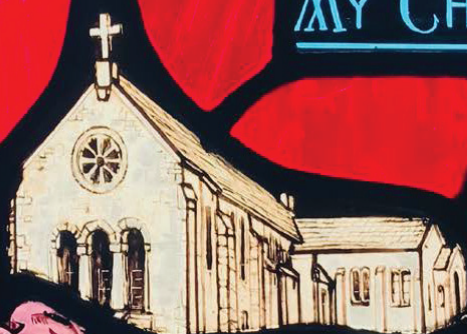

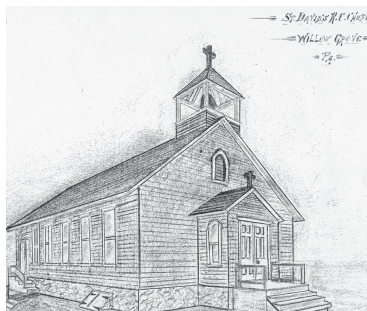

St. David's Mission Statement

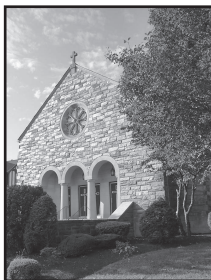

Most Frequently Asked Questions

How do I arrange a wedding?

Congratulations! In order to begin choosing a date for your wedding please contact our Pastor, Fr. Connors, at the parish office at 215-657-0252. Nothing can be scheduled until you speak with him. Couples must contact the church at least six months before the desired wedding date but it is recommended that the parties need to schedule a date at least a year in advance and before they schedule a reception venue. Weddings may also be scheduled on late Friday afternoon or evening and on Saturday's up to 4:00 PM.

How do I arrange for my child to be baptized?

Baptisms are celebrated the second and fourth Sundays of each month at 12:30 PM. Please call the parish office for further details and plan to attend a Pre-Jordan class prior to your child's Baptism. The Pre-Jordan instruction is held the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM. Parents and Godparents are encouraged to attend before the birth of the child.

Who do I contact about arranging the particulars of a Funeral Mass?

After you have made contact with a funeral director, a member of the family may call the Rectory at 215-657-0252 to arrange to meet with the Pastor to discuss the particulars of the funeral Mass.

How do I join the parish?

If you would like to register, please call the Rectory at 215-657-0252 between the hours of 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM to schedule an appointment with the Pastor to enroll in the parish.

I have recently been asked to be a godparent/sponsor. How do I receive a letter of eligibility?

St. David's will provide a letter of eligibility to registered parishioners who meet the requirements to be a godparent/sponsor. Please call our parish office at 215-657-0252.

I am interested in electronic contributions rather than envelopes. Who should I contact?

...are another Christian faith and wish to become Catholic.

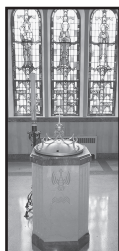

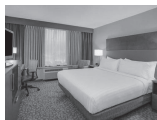

Miraculous Medal Novena: The Miraculous Medal, originally known as the Medal of the Immaculate Conception, was shown to Saint Catherine Labouré by the Blessed Virgin Mary on November 27, 1830. The Miraculous Medal Novena is prayed every Saturday morning following the 9:00 AM Mass. The Rosary is also prayed immediately after the Novena prayers. Prayer leaders are welcome.

Marion Bolger Recreational Program: This program provides recreational and social activities for young adults with severe cognitive and physical impairments who have transitioned from the educational program. This program is sponsored as a spiritual mission of Saint David Parish. It is independent of parish funds. Parents pay a monthly fee and donations are accepted. At the Marion Bolger Recreational Program, they respect the dignity of all people with special gifts. The program contains physical activities that promote use of all skills. They offer stimulation through visual, auditory, and sensory adaptations. They plan social and community events to encourage the individuals' recreational enjoyment. They have the opportunity for interaction with students from Queen of Angels and Our Lady of Confidence. Schools they attend Mass and promote a spiritual, safe, and caring environment. The Program goal is to work with an individual within their abilities, to recognize their potential, and to celebrate their accomplishments.

Respect Life Committee: On the first Sunday of each month parishioners pray on the corner of Abington Hospital against abortion of little innocents. The first Sunday in October is Respect Life Sunday. Many parishioners needed for Life Chain.

In January, parishioners go to Washington, DC to take a stand for the life of little innocents in protest of Roe vs. Wade.

Twice a year during the 40 Days of Life, people are needed for intervals of prayer outside the following abortion clinics: Planned Parenthood at Louis Drive in Warminster, PA and 12th & Locust, Phila, PA and the Women's Center - 777 Appletree Street, Phila, PA Your help is GREATLY needed.

On Mother's Day each year, roses and other things are sold to support the Pro-Life Union.

Blood Drive: The Red Cross come to our parish twice each year in late Spring and Fall. Parishioners contribute the lifesaving gift of blood to our neighbors. In addition to healthy blood donors, volunteers are needed to work for each visit to assist with signing in and other simple tasks.

Appalachia Service Project: Volunteers help to aid the housing needs of central Appalachia, West Virginia by making houses warmer, safer and drier for people caught in economic distress and unable to complete these repairs themselves. Home projects range from repairing foundations to roofing a house and everything in between. Teams consist of two adults and five teenagers who work every day for one week in the summer on home repairs, building a relationship with a family who live at the house, and participating in Christian gatherings and prayer in the evening. Teenagers who have completed 9th grade and adults over 25 years of age are needed in this respectful mission work. Most volunteers are unskilled or semi-skilled.

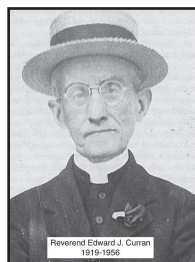

The Birth and 100 Year Growth of St. David from Mission to Parish

St. David Parish grew out of the Montgomery County community around her. In 1890, a small frame Catholic chapel, named St. Louis, was built on Penn Street in Hatboro to serve the community. Fr. Augustine Rufe, Pastor of St. Anthony Parish in Ambler, took the train to Hatboro every 2nd Sunday to conduct 2 Masses at the Mission Chapel. Masses were discontinued and restarted in Hatboro several times until 1916 and local Catholics often attended Mass at Immaculate Conception Parish in Jenkintown when the Hatboro Chapel was not available. The Archdiocesan office in 1916 urged Fr. Rufe to consider relocating his St. Luke's Glenside mission church in Hatboro to a track of land purchased on Easton Road (then "Doylestown Pike") in Willow Grove. Local Catholics in the area pooled their talents in a common building effort to build St. David's Chapel, rumored to be named after a local Catholic man, David Nolan, who dedicated his efforts until sundown each day to build the chapel with others.

The chapel was dedicated in December 1916 as a mission of St. Luke's church. The chapel was 28 feet by 70 feet with seating capacity of several hundred to attend Mass each Sunday. The main altar was flanked by two angels, and the statues of Mary and St. Joseph were located in the front corners of the church. The Archdiocesan office decided in 1919 that the chapel mission should become its own parish. The small chapel served the slowly emerging Catholic population and finally in June 1919 Fr. Edward J. Curran was named its first pastor. In upcoming years, nearby houses were bought to serve as a rectory and convent, which allowed St. David's first school to open in 1920, with classes first held in the chapel, and later moved to first floor of the convent when it was completed.



As the Willow Grove Catholic Community expanded in the 1920's, it was apparent more ground and a larger church was needed. Additional land was purchased at an adjoining location. By 1923 the parish consisted of a chapel and two houses serving as a convent and rectory (which also housed classrooms). A permanent school was built in 1926. The depression hit the world economy in late 1920's and no further building would occur on parish grounds for 26 years. The 1930's found hard times due to the Great Depression and the people and parish were greatly affected. The new buildings had put St. David Parish into deep debt, but parishioners held fund raisers to support the parish. The faith life of St. David continued to flourish as the first "Christian Doctrine" (CCD) was established in the 1930's to support those children attending public school. World War II began in 1939, and many of the young men of the parish left to serve their country. This too changed the pattern of American life. The administration of St. David throughout the 1940's was a difficult job for any priest. Fr. Curran was caring for the spiritual as well as the financial needs of the parish by forming parish councils, financial committees, ecumenism, peace programs and civil rights.



Fr. John Healy was appointed parish administrator in 1941 due to Father Curran's health problems. He brought zeal and dedication back to the parish and helped the parish grow in the 1950's from a single priest to a pastor, two assistant pastors and visiting clergy on Sundays. There were six Masses celebrated on Sundays at St. David Chapel, two at Fulmer Heights and three at the Penn Fruit Market auditorium. Fr. Healy recognized the need for a larger church and ground breaking took place in July 1951.

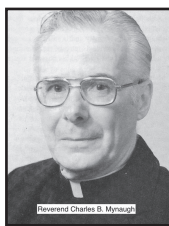
The real success of building the new church was that many parishioners donated windows, pews, Stations of the Cross, lighting fixtures, public address systems, shrines, and all the needs to build a beautiful, completely new church. Masses were first celebrated in the church basement in September 1952 and then in the Upper Church in December 1952. Father Healy was named second pastor in 1955 after the death of Fr. Curran but unfortunately also died seven months later.





Reverend Monsignor
Adolph J. Baum, LL.D.
1956-1972

Monsignor Adolph Baum was appointed 3rd pastor in 1956 and saw to the completion of a new school and a new convent. The 1960's affected the church through the effects of the Second Vatican Council, which had the main altar established with the priest facing the congregation and the Mass was changed from Latin to English. Early in the 1970's the lay people took over as Ministry of the Lectors.



Reverend Charles B. Mynaugh

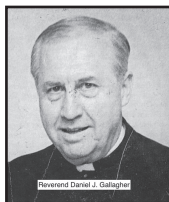
Monsignor Charles Mynaugh became the 4th pastor as Monsignor Baum's declining health forced him into retirement in 1972. He introduced the congregation to a more personal response to the "Peace Greeting" and the saying of daily Mass in the Chapel, previously used on Sundays only for a "crying room" and for Baptisms. Msgr. Mynaugh also brought to St. David the St. Charles Seminary Deaconate program with our first deacon,

Thomas Furey. Several other men have come to St. David as deacons and contributed their time and talents. The Charismatic Renewal program was introduced in the 1970's, as well as other spiritual programs like reconciliation services, consecration of the community of Willow Grove, and "Home Masses."



Reverend Michael V. Marek

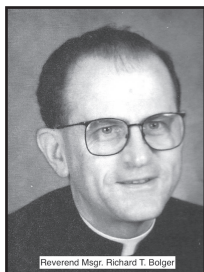
Reverend Michael Marek was appointed the 5th pastor when Msgr. Mynaugh transferred in 1976 over his concerns over parish debt levels. He continued to support the many spiritual programs that were part of this active parish and tried to manage down the large parish debt. He introduced "Increased Offertory Program" and other initiatives to reduce the debt; however, this financial pressure caused him to request a transfer in 1979. Rev. Marek brought many parish missions that filled the church to capacity.



Reverend Daniel J. Gallagher

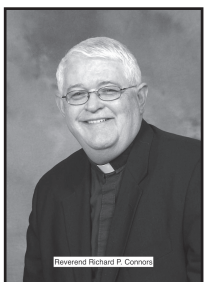
That is when the 6th pastor came to St. David, Father Daniel Gallagher. Father Gallagher saw the strenuous task of parish debt and established the first parish Financial Committee to lend its recommendations for handling parish finances. Father started using lay people for Eucharistic Ministry. Father's greatest achievement took several years but through frugal spending and generosity of parishioners, the parish debt was reduced from \$700,000 to \$300,000 and finally the parish was virtually free of the large debt of

building the schools and convent. A final project of Father Gallagher was to air condition the church before requesting his transfer in 1992.



Our 7th pastor, Monsignor Richard T. Bolger came to St. David in June 1992. Aside from a desire to provide parishioners with clean, well-functioning buildings and equipment, Monsignor's foremost concern was the spiritual needs of the parish. He established shrines to St. John Neumann and Blessed Katharine Drexel in the parish chapel and encouraged parishioner support in existing parish organizations. He established the first St. Vincent DePaul Society in 1992 and the Pastoral

Council in 1993. Monsignor expanded gifts for the underprivileged at Norristown State Hospital, celebrated Mass once a month for nurses and health-care workers, and reinstituted the ministry of seminarians to the parish. Monsignor was instrumental in bringing to the St. David School campus the Our Lady of Confidence School, a Catholic special education school of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia designed to serve children/young adults with an intellectual disability. He, in addition, created a parish spiritual mission in honor of his sister, Marion. The Marion Bolger Recreational Program is a program that provides recreational and social activities for young adults with severe cognitive and physical impairments who have transitioned from the educational program.



Our 8th pastor, Rev. Richard P. Connors was assigned to St. David Parish in 1999 as an assistant to Msgr. Richard T. Bolger. After ten years Father Connors was assigned to Nativity BVM in Philadelphia. In 2013 Father Connors was assigned by Archbishop Charles Chaput as Pastor of St. David Church succeeding Msgr. Bolger. Drawing upon his past experience at St. David, Father Connors continued the direction and spirit that Msgr. Bolger provided from 1992 to 2013. With Father Connors' leadership and support all the spiritual, social and educational needs have continued and have grown. The

changing needs of Catholics present new challenges but with the help of many active, involved and caring parishioners and with Father Connors' support and encouragement, our parish needs continue to be met while the direction of the parish is strong.

In this directory you will find many organizations and groups that serve our parish. However, first and foremost is the celebration of the Sacraments, especially Mass and Confession, and meeting parishioners' spiritual needs such as baptisms, weddings, and funerals. As chaplain for our local nursing home and for Abington Hospital, the Sacrament of the Sick was made available. Children who attended Mass on Sunday always knew where to find the lollypops after Mass.

As vocations to the Church are few, many parishes that used to have more than one priest have found that the pastor is now the only one offering priestly ministry. But, at the same time, laity of the parish stepped up to assist in the needs of the people of our parish. The Parish Council, the Finance Council, and the 100th Anniversary Committee have particular importance. Having said the above, St. David is also blessed to have two Permanent Deacons, William F. Eliason (ordained 1995) and Christopher J. Mars (ordained 2017) who minister sacramentally and educationally to the parish.

Through the capable assistance of many people: choir, EM's, lectors, ushers, rectory staff, deacons, excellent schools, youth programs etc. and YOU, we are **“living our baptism calling to witness to Christ”**. **This is why we began as a parish 100 years ago, and it still the why we are parish today and every day.**

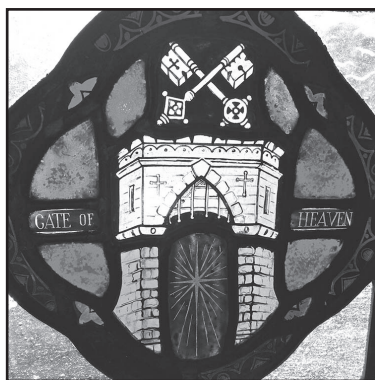
